Music Notes | A Multitude of Voices

In an effort to create a fuller and more inclusive picture of the richness of our musical heritage, we will be exploring music composed by women, BIPOC, and other historically under-represented composers.

This fall we will be focusing on women composers, including music composed by Sarah MacDonald, Mel Bonis, Jessica French, Stephanie Martin, Joy-Leilani Garbutt, and others. Despite being historically under-represented in the musical canon, women have been active contributors to all eras and styles of music from antiquity to contemporary.

The Oxen, heard this evening, was composed by **Jessica French.** Jessica French is a Seattle-based composer, soprano, and music educator. As a composer, she specializes in sacred and secular choral music. Her works have been commissioned and performed by various ensembles including Seattle Pro Musica, Northwest Girlchoir, Choral Arts Northwest, Opus 7 Vocal Ensemble, and Kantorei of Kansas City. Jessica has a rare neurological ability called synesthesia, in which the senses of the brain are linked to one another, mainly in the form of colors associated with notes, timbres, and words. These colors associated with the text help direct the musical choices she makes when composing. Her music often contains shifting modality and various key changes to reflect the changes in color.
